Ashford WI

At last month's WI meeting, cheese maker and enthusiast Alan Salt gave a very interesting and entertaining talk about the history of cheese-

making in
Derbyshire – and
as a bonus brought
plenty of samples
with him! In 2012
Alan was one of
the founders of the
Hartington
Creamery, based at
Pikehall Farm. The
original Hartington



Creamery was established by the Duke of Devonshire in the 1870's in Hartington village itself, before sadly closing in 2009. Alan and his colleagues revived what was once a

burgeoning industry across Derbyshire. Throughout the late 1800s and early 1900s, Derbyshire was home to some 40 cheese factories and many farms in the area - including around Ashford produced cheese, until it became more profitable for farmers to supply milk to the urban townships. The first products produced at the Creamery were Peakland Blue and Peakland White both of which are unique to Creamery. The production of Blue Stilton – which can only be legally produced in the counties of Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire - was added in 2014 and these days production has expanded to include over 10 different types of cheese.

In keeping with the cheese theme, the competition was for 'Best Cheese Accompaniment'.
Congratulations go to Barbara for her very impressive entry!

Also last month, a group of WI ladies visited the beautiful gardens at Highfields House, Oakerthorpe, followed by lunch - a lovely time was had by all. And during well-dressing week, the Ashford WI laid on afternoon tea for Somercotes Ladies Group. It was a very successful day, so a big thanks go to all those members who baked, served, washed-up and generally helped out.

Next month the Ashford WI annual lunch will take place at Piedaniel's restaurant on Bakewell on July 4th.



SHELDON JOTTINGS

After all the poor spring weather, how wonderful it was to see people



Michael Lester who passed away so suddenly was laid to rest in the churchyard on the 6th June, following a beautiful service led by Canon Tony. The Church was full almost an hour before the Service was due to begin and the numbers of mourners who gathered outside the Church to follow the proceedings, which were relayed to them, was a tribute to how liked and respected Mick was, as a colleague, friend and neighbour. The Service concluded graveside, as movingly, the sun clouds. peaked through the **Afterwards** congregation the gathered in the 'Cock and Pullet' to continue to chat and reminisce with friends and family. A tractor run will take place on Sunday September 1st starting at the 'Cock and Pullet' at

10:30am in memory of Mick Lester and the organisers hope that you will give the event your full support whether on a tractor or as a spectator.

Following the long dry spell of weather in 2022 a Neolithic henge, was discovered, during an aerial survey, on the eastern boundary of Sheldon Parish. During 2023 an archaeological team from Sheffield University conducted a dig at the site and discovered that the henge consisted of a circular bank enclosing a ditch. The team returned for three weeks this June and opened another ditch at the south western edge of the feature and two adjoining areas in the centre. They made a number of discoveries including flints, a post hole and a range of pottery thought to date from the early bronze age indicating that the site was in use for longer than previously thought. This, the Sheldon Henge, is one of only three in the Peak District making it an important discovery. We would like to thank those involved for their willingness to speak with and explain the features of the dig and site with us less knowledgeable visitors

During July, arguably the most important event in the calendar year takes place in Sheldon, when we can entertain and show others our lovely village at its best and raise funds to maintain village amenities. We are of

course talking about Sheldon Day and the ever popular Fell Race which place on the takes previous Thursday. The Fell Race on 18th July at 7:30pm starting in the centre of the village takes the runners downhill to the banks of the River Wye, following its course and then uphill back to the village, a course gruelling enough for even the most ardent participant. Please come to give your support to the runners.

This year Sheldon Day takes place on Saturday 20th July with the usual full range of activities, cream teas in the hall, stalls on the village greens, games and displays on the playing field — something for everyone. Please give Andrew and the team your full support on this important day.

We must congratulate Ashford on their Well Dressing Week. The wells were spectacular and the floral displays in the Church were wonderful. Our turn now! Fingers crossed for good weather!!

Wine of the Month

Athlon Greek Assyrtiko 2023/4



With the summer having finally arrived, thoughts turn to drinking crisp, dry white wine in the garden...at least mine do! The white Assyrtiko grape is closely associated with the Greek holiday Island of Santorini where it produces a distinctive dry white wine with a salty tang. The problem is that yields from the dry volcanic soils are low, the wines are sought-after and can be fantastically expensive. You can easily pay £30 to over £100 a bottle for a good example. Aldi have cleverly sourced this wine from the Greek mainland: the Macedonia region, close to the northern border. Despite the hot climate in this part of the country, earlyharvested Assyrtiko produces a fresh, dry white wine with a respectable 12% alcohol by volume. Pale in colour with a hint of subtropical fruit on the nose, it has clean pineapple-like freshness on the palate and that distinctive stoney-salty finish. It is not always available at Aldi in Bakewell but it is well worth adding a few bottles to your shopping trolley when you see it.

New system makes it easier to report potential breaches of planning controls

A new way for people to report potential breaches of planning controls is being

introduced by the Peak District National Park Authority.

The new online enquiry form makes it easier and quicker to provide relevant information and for Authority officers to carry out an effective investigation. The form includes an interactive map which can show the precise location of the property in question and photographs can also be uploaded.

Breaches of planning control occur when someone carries out development, such as building works or a change of use, without first obtaining planning permission.

Principal enforcement planner Andrew Cook explains: "The National Park is an area of national, regional and local importance and is one of 15 national parks in the UK to be designated for their natural beauty, cultural heritage and wildlife and for people to enjoy them.

The Authority recognises the importance of an effective planning enforcement service to protect what is special about the National Park and to safeguard the interests of residents, businesses and visitors from the harmful effects of unauthorised development.

We receive between 350 and 400 reports each year, many via e-mails or phone calls, and the information we get can sometimes be unclear or short of detail. We hope that the online enquiry form will result in a more consistent level of information being provided at the outset which will allow us to investigate more efficiently."

In cases of extreme urgency – such as demolition of a listed building or the felling of trees covered by a Tree Preservation Order – officers can be informed immediately by telephone so they can act more promptly. An online form will still need to be completed and submitted.

We encourage enquirers to provide their name and contact details so that we can get in touch if we require further information or clarification and can report back once we have carried out our investigation.

Whilst the subject of the enquiry is public information, the enquirer's name, address or other personal details will not be published or otherwise made available as they are protected by data protection legislation.

POT LUCK

Dijon Chicken Serves 2

Quick, easy and tasty!



Ingredients:

2 chicken breasts cubed

200g mushrooms, thickly sliced

1 garlic clove

100ml white wine

200ml chicken stock

75ml double cream/crème fraîche

1 teaspoon Dijon/wholegrain mustard Parsley, chopped

Method

1. Fry chicken in a little vegetable oil for 5 minutes.



- 2. Add mushrooms and garlic and continue to fry for another 5 minutes.
- 3. Add wine and let it bubble for 2 minutes before adding the stock.
- 4. Cook at a gentle simmer for about 15 minutes until the chicken is completely cooked through.

5. Stir in the cream, mustard and some chopped parsley.



6. Serve with rice or couscous.

Farming News

The recent warm and dry weather made us very busy.



Shearing the sheep was the first job. The wool now is worth very little. I think last year we received between 40 and 50p per fleece. The shearer charges upwards

of £1.75 to clip each sheep. However it is a satisfying job when done and of course the sheep feel so much better. We then did a second cut of silage and completely filled the clamp. The crop was huge, so much so it wouldn't all go in the clamp so we had to open up the first clamp and top that up. One of the advantages of a wet Spring!

Last job this week was making some lovely June hay. I wish you could bottle the smell as it evokes such childhood memories.

The maize two weeks ago looked yellow and was struggling to grow so we gave it another top up of nitrogen and potash as it is a very hungry crop. Along with the hot sun it looks so much better and has grown inches in a week.

Along with Adam Henson our wheat and barley are full of black grass. This is an invasive weed that grows above the host crop but unfortunately they have banned the weed killer we used so you can see it growing above the cereals in the land at Hassop. We haven't had any before this year but think it came in bought in straw which was then spread on the land when the sheds were cleaned out. The last few days we have been busy tidying up around the farm. We are having a visit from Waitrose head buyer on Tuesday. Not sure where they are staying but we are being taken out for lunch at the Ashford which will be a treat!
